Child 1: John Joseph Cash and Charlotte Elizabeth Steele Todd

John Joseph was born on 9th September 1861 at Stony Creek Oberon. There is a NSW BDM record for a Male Cash # 5010/1861 born to Thomas and Mary A in District of Bathurst. This is likely to be John Joseph. He married **Charlotte Elizabeth Steele Todd** on 15th December 1890 at O'Connell.

The Todds

Charlotte was the daughter of David Smith TODD and Lettisha/Letitia Mary Connelly. She was the second child and eldest daughter born on 17th April 1868 at Essington Oberon. David was a free settler having been born in 1841 at Lilford, East Northamptonshire Borough, Northamptonshire, England the son of William Lewin Todd and Charlotte Lovell. David was baptised on 26th Sept 1841 at Warmington Northampton UK. David had arrived in Australia on the ship 'John Bright ' in June 1849. He was 7 years old and accompanied his parents and siblings Mary Ann and Lewin. They were assisted passengers. His father was an engineer according to the ships indent.

The Connelly's

Lettisha had been born in Belfast County Down Ireland in 1844 although her immigration papers state 1846. She emigrated on the ship 'Annie Wilson' in 1862 with her mother Elizabeth Steele from Holywood Belfast and her siblings Anne Jane [1838-1872]; Elizabeth Tudor Connelly [1842-1901]; Mary Douglas Connelly [1846-1902]; George Porteous Connelly [1849-1907] a family tree notes he was a shoemaker. There is a younger sibling William John Steele Connelly who had been born in Holywood Belfast¹ on 25th Sept 1853 according to family trees and had died on 6th May 1854 in Holywood. Her brother Luke Connelly had also died young according to family trees having been born on 30th Nov 1840 and died in Holywood on 10th July 1854. Some trees have another sibling Martha born 1837 and died young.² Letitia's father George Porteous Connelly had died on 12th February 1854 in Holywood Belfast. Geneanet has his names as George Parkes Porteous Connelly having been born on 16th Sept 1808 in Holywood Belfast to Archibald Connelly and Ann Jane Porteous. Poor Elizabeth had lost her husband and 2 sons within months. Their depositor was Luke 'Farrell' Connelly was George's brother and the family had obtained a reference for their emigration from the protestant Minister of the Church of Holywood. This indicates they were Irish protestants. If family trees are correct George's grandfather was Archibald Connelly and he was born in Southend Argyll, Scotland between 1758-1768 and had died in Holywood Belfast in 1795. Luke had deposited funds in 1861 so it took a little while for the family to sail. Luke had unfortunately died in 1862 in Penrith NSW. Elizabeth Connelly mum of Letitia is listed as a house servant on shipping indents.

There is an interesting story in a family tree from Elizabeth Steele:

" Elizabeth Steele Connelly of Sydney, New South Wales, Australia, wrote her brother John Steele, Jr. of Toquerville, Utah, USA on 2 September 1873 about the Connellys: "my husband [George Porteuous Connelly] grand[father] Archey Connelly name Archey Conneila he was capten of a manaware ship that Come in to the Belfast before the rebellian of ireland and his wife was ichord and two sunes Arch and Jorge"

This tells us that Archibald Snr was a ships captain of a man-o-war ship. The Irish Rebellion occurred in 1798 https://www.amrevmuseum.org/virtualexhibits/cost-of-revolution/pages/part-4-irish-revolution and

An online family history search site for Archibald Connelly https://irelandxo.com/ireland/down/holywood-down/message-board/connelly shows us how confusing it can get when you have 2 or 3 generations of Archibald Connelly's from the same town and family. I write this here to show some of the rabbit holes genealogists go down!

The site shows us that from Griffiths Valuation 1861 Archibald Connelly of Holywood was a tenant and rented a bakery. An Archibald of Holywood died in 1862. Below is the Griffiths Valuation and some sites have it as 1864 not 1861. We will remain with 1861 to honour Julie's research above.

Archibald had a son David and a daughter Jane according to the research. They concluded there was only 1 Archibald from Holywood but we know there were a couple!

Archibald Connelly born 1758 in Scotland and died 1795 Holywood- the grandfather Elizabeth references in her letter to her brother. His wife is unknown but one site has her as Nancy Farrell of Holywood ³. Archibald #1 had 2 sons Archey and Jorge or Archibald born 1778 in Holywood and George 1783-1834. This Archibald who we will call # 2 married Anne Jane Porteous. Did they have a son called Archibald? There is an Archibald Connelly

baptised in Dublin in 1815 and born to Archibald and Ann Connelly but is he the same family? Some family trees have him listed against the Holywood family.

The 1852 grocer and painter has to be Archibald #2 or does it, he would be 74 years of age. They have records also for 1846 of the same Archibald. The research site states that an Archibald is still a tenant on the land identified in Griffiths Valuation in 1876.

Let's see if Jane and David can tell us anything? Jane's death certificate leads us to her birth date of around 1846 so Archibald #2 is unlikely to be her dad. Archibald #3 fits this bill if he exists. This certificate also tells us Jane was a spinster and a school mistress but does not link her to a father. The 1901 and 1911 census links Jane and

David together and they have a nephew Charles James Connelly born around 1881. No accessible records shine anymore light on this.

We cannot get any further than what Julie has on the research site. A brickwall has been reached.

Elizabeth Steele

Let's have a closer look at **Elizabeth Steele's** story. She was born on 28th February 1818 in Holywood Belfast to John Steele [1763-1841] and Ann /Nancy Kennedy. We can go back further and say her maternal grandparents were William Kennedy [1757-1818] and Jean McIlvine [1757-1827] of Holywood and her great grandparents John Kennedy born 1727 Holywood and Elizabeth Martin born 1737 Holywood. Elizabeth had a brother John Steele Jnr born in Holywood on 21st March 1821 and indeed emigrated to USA and a sister Jane born 30th Sept 1819 again in Holywood. She married **George Parkes Porteous Connelly** on 3rd November 1835 in Holywood. They produced 7 children listed above.

1854 was not kind to Elizabeth with the loss of her husband and 2 sons Luke and William. She must have struggled as a single mother in Belfast with 5 young children. We do not know if her parents were of any means.

What was Belfast like at this time?

As Ireland's only industrialised large town, Victorian Belfast was, for much of the period, outwardly prosperous and the town displayed a noticeable sense of civic pride, which in 1842 led the English novelist William Makepeace Thackeray to remark that Belfast appeared 'hearty, thriving and prosperous as if it had money in its pocket and roast beef for dinner.' However, like similar British industrial towns, Belfast had a much less refined underbelly and an urban infrastructure that was largely unfit to cope with a rapidly growing population.

Adjoining many of its main thoroughfares was a network of confined backstreets, entries, courtyards and alleyways, where scenes of <u>deprivation</u>, <u>overcrowding</u>, <u>and poor sanitation</u> could readily be found. Such conditions saw illnesses like fever, dysentery, tuberculosis and many others regularly break out in epidemic proportions; and in February 1832, following months of distressing reports from Europe, Asiatic cholera, a new contagion unfamiliar in most of world outside areas of the Indian subcontinent where it had originated made its first appearance in Belfast. Three further cholera epidemics would follow in 1848-49, 1854 and 1866, themselves part of deadly pandemics that swept the globe, all of them influential in altering the world's public health landscape......But when cholera did return to Belfast in 1854 all the town's municipal bodies made a concerted effort to mitigate its impact. Despite this, Belfast was one of the worst affected large Irish towns. The epidemic began in March 1854 with cases reported in Smithfield and in Washington Street and came to an end in October/ November. Accurate statistics are difficult to ascertain, but the Poor Law Commissioners recorded 1,871 cases and 677 mortality). https://epidemic-belfast.com/6-cholera-in-nineteenthcentury-belfast/

have been in a chief degree confined to the London metropolis. Since our lest publication the weekly returns of the Registrar-General have been of an opposite character—one gloomy in the extreme, the others giving every symptom of an abstement of the disease in London. From 847 three weekl ago, the mertality sprung in one week up to 1287, an increase of over 400 in a single week. The mortality the next week, ending on the 9th ult., showed a still more alumning increase, being 2050. But the number of deaths from cholera in the week ending on the 16th fell to 1549; and in the week ending the 23rd ult. the number of deaths was only 1284. From this reduction, and the very great change in the weather from extreme heat to an almost frosty atmosphere, it is confidently hoped that a rapid decrease may now be looked for.

In Liverpool the cholera has become epidemic, and in some days recently from 20 to 30th deaths have taken place there. It has taken a flight through several towns in the provinces, but has not manifested anything like the malignity with which it has attacked the inhabitants of the metropolis.

From Scotland we do not hear any alarmin accounts of its progress.

The disease has made and havee in the morth of Ireland, particularly in Belfast; but income accounts speak of a decrease in the mortality. It has shown itself at Finglas, a small village in the suburbs of Dublin, but not in any great force; and recent accounts speak of its total disappearance from that quarter.—Home News, Oct. S.

It is a fair conclusion to make that Elizabeth lost her husband and sons to Cholera. The epidemic began in March George died in the February so was he an early case or died from something else? William in May and Luke in July in the middle of the outbreak. The family would have survived the Irish Famine of 1845-1849.

However, in the 1840s, a plant infection — potato blight, caused by the fungus Phytopthera infestans — showed us how an environmental catastrophe in a vulnerable community can profoundly affect human history. Before the visitation of potato blight, the population of Ireland was the most rapidly growing in Europe in the early 1840s. Yet between 1845 and 1850, Ireland's population fell by over one-third — with 3 million people disappearing from the island — half through death and half through emigration. https://www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/articles/PMC6735970/

Elizabeth and her surviving children would be one of those who emigrated. Why Australia? We know that her brother in law Luke Farrell Connelly [1810-1862] had emigrated before 1851 to Australia as he had married Margaret Josephine McGhee on 10th Feb 1851 in Sydney. To date no emigration records can be found for Luke. The depositor record shows us that Luke was the person who sponsored Elizabeth's emigration and he paid the deposit for the family in 1861.

Much was written about the Annie Wilson: thanks to Frances Nash for this research. As a house servant Elizabeth could earn 26-30 pound per year depending on which edition you read and it is stated that good female servants were scarce. George could be put to work for 15-26 pound and the girls would probably earn the same as their mother as servants. The indents above show that all the family could read and write and they were Chrich of England Protestants. They arrived on 8th April 1862 but went into quarantine as the papers indicate below.

IMMIGRANTS BY THE ANNIE WILSON.--The ship Annie Wilson, 1118 tons, Captain Duckett, from Liverpool 31st December, with 425 assisted immigrants, arrived yesterday. She was placed in quarantine by the Health-officer in consequence of some cases of scarlet fever, and one of measles having occurred on the voyage. The first case of scarlet fever occurred on the 15th March, and there were two cases subsequently. A case of measles occurred on 2nd April. No death, however, has arisen from either of these diseases, and but one during the voyage--that of an aged person, from consumption. Amongst the immigrants by this vessel are 70 colliers for the Newcastle mines. They are not under an engagement to any one company, but will, we understand, be apportioned between the four companies, who were jointly engaged in subscribing the funds for the payment of their passages under the assisted immigration regulations. Dr. Alleyne has given the necessary sanitary orders for the cleaning of the clothes, &c., of the immigrants; and It is believed from present appearances, that the quarantine will have to be enforced for a few days only, when the healthy portion of the passengers will be brought up to Hyde Park Barracks, the sick alone, if there should then be any, remaining behind.



Sydney. They had 11 children, 2 dying young. Her nephew Luke Eastment committed suicide at her house on 19th March 1894 after shooting Captain Donald. Elizabeth died 19th Jan 1901 at RPA Camperdown Hospital aged 59 yrs. Interestingly her parents are listed on her death certificate as John Steele Connelly and Elizabeth Gelston

The Assaliant of Captain Donald Commits Suicide.—Yesterday afternoon a young man named Luke Eastment committed suicide under sensational circumstances at the residence of his aunt, Mrs. M'Murtrie, No. 132 Wilson-street, Darlington. Eastment had been in the employ of the Parramatta River Ferry Company, but on the afternoon of the 15th instant he was dismissed. The same night he travelled to Hunter's Hill in the boat by which Captain Donald, the manager of the company, travelled. After landing the captain noticed a man following him, but did not pay any attention to the circumstance. A few minutes later two shots were fired, and turning round Captain Donald saw the man, whom he recognised as Eastment, with a smoking revolver in his hand. Asked what he meant by his action, Eastment replied "I'll soon show you," and fired two more shots, but with no effect. Eastment then ran off. The next morning the matter was reperted to the Ryde police, and Senior-constable Banks and Constable White traced Eastment to No. 132 Wilson-street, Darlington. They went there yesterday afternoon, but as soon as the man heard them ask for him he rushed upstairs. Directly afterwards a pistol-shot was heard, and on going to the bedroom the officers found him lying dead on the floor with a wound in his breast, immediately over the heart. By his side was a five-chambered revolver loaded in four chambers. The body was removed to the South Sydney Morgue.


A SERBATIONAL SUICIDE.—The City Coroner, Mr. J. C. Woore, J.P., held an inquest yesterday in the South Sydney Morgue on the body of Luke Eastment, the man who, to avoid arrest, shot himself on Monday afternoon while at the residence of his sunt, Elizabeth M'Murtrie, No. 132 Wilsonstreet, Newtown. Mrs. M'Murtrie deposed that the deceased was a single man, 25 years of age, and that he had been captain of one of the Parramatta River steamers. On Saturday last, after 11 p.m., he called at her house and asked to be permitted to stay the night. His request was acceled to, and he also stayed there on Sunday night. Senior-constable Banks said that on Saturday last he received information that Eastment had attempted to shoot Captain Donald, manager of the Parramatts River Steam Ferry Company. Witness, who had traced Eastment to Mrs. M'Murtrie's house, went there on Monday afterneon in company with Constable White. He knocked at the door, and on its being opened Eastment rushed to an upstains beircom and shot himself in the left breast. He was found lying on the bed with a revolver in his right hand. He gave two gasps, and expired. A post-mortem examination disclosed that the bullet had penetrated the heart and left lung. The jury returned a verdict of suicide. In a book which was found upon the deceased was a memorandum that he intended four bullets for Captain Donald and one for himself, and that he would not be taken alive.




Mary Douglas Connelly [1846-1919] had 3 marriages. The first to George Wells [1842-1903] whom she divorced in 1902 after 37 years marriage. Her second husband was John Ennis who she married in 1909 in Waterloo Sydney and her third husband was Joseph Brooks who she married at Parramatta in 1915. Mary did not have any children. She died at 24 Denison St Newtown on 27th October 1919 of apoplexy aged 70 yrs. Interestingly her death certificate states that her father George Porteous Connelly was a medical practitioner. If this is correct could this explain his early death in February 1854 before cholera became an epidemic in March of that year? Thanks to Frances Nash for the records.

George Jnr was a bootmaker in Sydney. The 1900 Sands Director has his workshop in Balmain. He married Esther Louisa Crowley in Sydney on 8th May 1875 and they had 9 children with the names Porteous, Letitia, Jane Anne peppered in their names. Interestingly one of his children is Esther Louisa Gelston Connelly [1882-1961]. Gelston is the surname used on Mary Tudor's death certificate, could Elizabeth have partnered with a Mr Gelston hence the use of the name? George died young at the age of 57 years at his residence 71 Foucart St Rozelle on February 27th 1907. He too was buried at the Necroplis Rookwood Section F Row 6 where his sister is buried.




David Smith's Todd's lineage

William Lewin Todd and Charlotte Lovell

David was the eldest child and son of **William Lewin Todd** [1818-1874] and **Charlotte Lovell**. William and Charlotte had been married in Warmington Northamptonshire on 11th October 1840. William was 22 years of age having been born on 2nd Feb 1818 at Tansor in Northamptonshire. His Marriage certificate does not list a father.



It is very likely William was illegitimate given the record below:

The indents on the ship bringing him to Australia and his grave records indicate he was born in Tansor in 1818 on 2^{nd} August.

Charlotte's parents were **Smith Lovell** [1795-1867] a labourer and **Mary Ann Deer** [1795-1848]. She had been born in Warmington in 1819. Her paternal grandparents were **Thomas Lovell** [1758-1838] and **Alice Ellis** [1755-1840] of Buckinghamshire. Her paternal great grandparents were **Thomas Lovell** [1730-1782] and **Elizabeth Pierce** [born 1730] of Drayton Buckinghamshire. Her paternal great grandparents on the Ellis side were **Francis and Sarah Ellis**.

William and Charlotte emigrated to Australia on the ship 'John Bright' with their children **David Smith**, **Mary Ann** and **Lewin** in 1849. They arrived on the 8th June in Sydney. They went on to have one more child; Edwin [1850-1877]. Some family trees have Edwin born under a bullock Tray at Bogan River NSW. This is probable given that William was a carrier-see below reference. **Charlotte** died on 5th July 1868 at Stony Creek near Essington.

William remarried **Ellen Gentle** the widow of Edward Terry Wilson [1830-1869] in 1870 at Bathurst. They went on to have two more children: **Caleb William** [1871-1958] and **Hester Louisa** [1873-1946].

William died in Gladesville Asylum, Gladesville Hospital on 15th October 1874 and is buried in the Asylum cemetery. https://www.findagrave.com/memorial/191591626/william-todd. He was 55 years old. This was the same year Hamilton Murray [Mary Ann Smith's sister in laws father] was admitted to Gladesville Asylum. He had been admitted in the February and died in the May. It was one month after Hamilton died that William was admitted.

Reference to his death is recorded in a family tree:

First settled at Obley, New South Wales between Molong & Yeoval. Was overseer on Sheep Station. Later became a carrier of supplies from Sydney via Bullock team. After 1870 William started having fits and had nervous breakdown. Was taken to Bathurst 26 May 1874 and committed to Gladesville Psychiatric Hospital on 9 June 1874. He died of a stroke there. I want to tease out the life of one of Willilam's daughters Mary Ann as it intrigues me that this might be the story about a Mary Ann and a McNab rather than it being Mary Ann Smith and a McNab.

Mary Ann Todd, David's sister married **Peter McNab** in 1870 at Bathurst. As mentioned on the front page on the Mary Ann Smith website page, Peter owned property around Essington. This Mary Ann and Peter went on to have 12 children. Their youngest was George Reuban McNab [1887-1976]. The McNabs were an Essington family. Mary Ann died on 12th December 1917 at Bathurst and is buried in Oberon Cemetery⁵ with her husband who died on 19th June 1913 at Essington. The names of her ancestors are peppered through her childrens names- Lovell, Letitia, Archibald, Charlotte, Lewin.






Hugh Kenneth McNab [1884-1966] Source- Family Tree







She married **Phillip Joseph Foran** at Rockley on 18th June 1886 when she would have been 22 years of age. Phillip was the son of **Patrick Foran** and **Ellen Grady.**

The Rockley Manner, his death certificate and grave information tells us **Patrick Foran** was the son of **Cornelius Foran and Margaret Hogan** of Tipperary Ireland. Patrick was born at Clonmel Tipperary about 1797. Patrick's or Pat's Ticket of Leave [31st July 1828] tells us he was convicted and sentenced to Life at Waterford City in Lent 1819 which would have been between February and April. The Settler and Convict lists confirm it was in fact March 1819 when he was convicted. He is described as 5 feet 10 inches, with light brown hair, grey eyes and a fresh complexion. The Rockley Manner states this was for burglary and highway robbery. He would go on to receive a conditional pardon on 21st November 1835. However, Pat also known as Patrick Evander Foran did not remain out of gaol in NSW. He was charged and found guilty of maliciously shooting the dog of James Burgess and ill treating his servant boy. He was convicted and ordered to be flogged with 100 lashes and be on bread and water for a week. It was hoped this would improve his conduct. He was then sent back to his employee, Mr Lawson. He was listed as being incorrigible. See the excerpt below from Colonial Secretarys Papers 3rd August 1822 from Bench of Magistrates Parramatta.






The above record indicates that there was a mistake in citing the ship Ellen came out on, it was in fact the City of Edinburgh not the Brampton. Ellen Grady, age 16, departed Cork, Ireland on the 23 Jun 1828, on board the convict transport "City of Edinburgh", arriving in the Colony of NSW on 12 Nov 1828. She came with her mother, Margaret, 2 brothers ,James age 13 & Patrick age 5 & 2 sisters, Judith age 12 & Mary age 10. The family came 'free' to join their father, who had been transported to the colony in 1823..he had been sentenced to Life. Ref: NSW Records Immigration Reel 2420. Thank you to family history from micah6.

As Pat Foran was a convict he needed to apply for permission to marry Ellen who was a free settler. See below.



Their marriage certificate indicates they were married on 10th July 1829 in the Parish of St Mary's. It does not indicate whether it is Sydney or Bathurst. Margaret Grady and Michael Moran of Sydney were witnesses.





NSW Government Gazette 9th Jan 1839 Patrick Snr received a Conditional Pardon on 21st November 1835 and was it again in 1839 as indicated by the newspaper article or did it take 4 years to be finalised? Did something happen in between these years ie another conviction to warrant 2 conditional pardon periods?



The Rockley Manner page 105 tells us that Patrick Joseph Foran was a "bushranger" of sorts just like his father was in Ireland. Patrick Joseph Foran and James Kelly joined forces in a spate of armed robbery. In 1866 Patrick was under suspicion of stealing a horse from John Mackie. At the time he was "28 years old 5'7" high, dark brown hair and whiskers, one eye defective; well known to the Bullock Flat (Oberon) and Bathurst police." He was also convicted of robbery against John Marsh. In 1867 Lawrence Cummings, James Kelly and Patrick robbed William Whittacker's Half Way House on the Carcoar road. Kelly and Foran were arrested and given 10 years each. While being transported to Sydney with 13 other prisoners there was an attempted escape. Prisoners Rutherford and Holmes did escape but were soon recaptured. Patrick received a conditional pardon in 1874. See April 23rd 1867 Empire article below and Sydney Morning Herald 23rd April 1867 rendition of the trial.



Cornelius like his brothers got into trouble with the law also. The Rockley Manner [pge 106] tells us *In 1867* Cornelius and James Humphries were suspects on a charge of arson against Eneas McDonald near Taralga. Earlier in February Cornelius had been arrested for the suspected involvement in the robbery at the Half Way House Carcoar. He, along with his brother John were released on bail while Patrick received his 10 years. It seems that Con may have been deterred by his near brushes with the law as there seems to be no other reports on him. The article below from Sydney Morning Herald [SMH] 8th October 1867 seems to contradict this

Jane Graham, being duly sworn, deposed: I am is the employ of William Oates, of Guyong; I was living there when the bushrangers came in June; I knew one of them (Foran) from having lived near to where he previously resided; I first saw the men in the bar, and at once knew him; I had not seen the other man before to my knowledge; There is the man; "Foran made use show him the bedroom, which he entered and took some money; I have no doubt prisoner is the man. Cross-examined: I had a good opportunity of seeing both men — Foran in the bedroom, the other men in the bar, Foran's com

prisoner, but I did not notice how many; prisoner's front face was toward me in the bar; I did not previously swear that the only sight I had of prisoner in the bar was his side face (deposition put in and read). Other evidence was given in corroboration of the above, and the prisoner, being found guilty, was sentenced to tan years' imprisonment, with hard labour.

Did Cornelius or his companion Thomas O'Neill receive the 10 years hard labour? It does not indicate that Cornelius was indicted.

A family history follows from the handcocks:

JOHN, son of PATRICK FORAN and ELLEN (nee GRADY), was born in 1846. Of the Foran brothers John seemed more determined to make his mark in the world. For almost two years he was constantly defying the law. In December 1865, he was convicted at Rockley, of illegally using a horse - receiving 3 months imprisonment. Until 1867 he was comparatively quiet but in April of that year he and Lawrence Cumming were suspected of stealing a horse from William Bromielow (probably Brownlow). On April 4, William Todd of Stoney Creek was robbed of an amount of money. A description of one of the men fitted that of John Foran. Later that same month both Cummings and Foran held up an Inn Keeper, Edward Lock, at Dirty Swamp, near Mutton Falls. The Bathurst Times covered in detail, an account of this robbery on April 17, 1867. From there Foran and Cummings proceeded to Webb's store at Mutton Falls where their approach was noticed and Cummings was shot in the face. On May 15 1867, Holmes and Foran (probably John), stole two horses, and then on the 29th May they were suspected of arson on Mr Lock's shed at Dirty Swamp. October 18, John was once again convicted of three charges of robbery with arms and sentenced to 15 years on the road gangs, serving between six and seven years before receiving a conditional pardon.

JOHN married Catherine English in 1877 and had 12 children. His granddaughter, Irene Mayer of Bathurst said he worked hard during his marriage as did his wife and family. It would seem that John had learned his lesson while in prison as Irene said he was "extra - extra" honest in his later life. At one stage John and Catherine lived at Foley's Creek, after indulging in a few drinks, John argued with Catherine, waving a candle around as he argued, the curtains caught fire and it wasn't long before the thatched cottage was consumed by fire. Thankfully their quarters were in three separate buildings. John also kept a pet crow, a magpie and a fox. The fox was short lived after it escaped and beheaded Catherine's hens. Irene and her sister knew that John had a reputation as a cranky man but they saw no sight in it themselves. John always carried boiled lollies in his pockets for his grandchildren, complete with pieces of tobacco and fluff.

Catherine had a hard life, she reared 10 of her own children besides several of their grandchildren. When she could get to Mass she had to walk some distance. She hated to see anything killed and at one time when John was away she was forced to kill a sheep for eating. She cried all the way through the process. John died in 1923 at the age of 77 years and Catherine in 1931 at the age of 75 years. Both are buried in Oberon cemetery.



9. Phillip Joseph Foran- the youngest child and husband of Agnes Cash. Phillip was born on 5th July 1849 at Kings Creek Brewongle NSW. Phillip did not escape the law either. In 1865 he was charged with stealing a saddle and imprisoned at Bathurst for 2 months. In 1868 he was convicted again of stealing a saddle and on 30th Sept 1868 at Bathurst was sentenced to 12 months gaol. He was described at the time as 19 years of age, of slight build, in good health, literate with good conduct. He was a labourer, gold miner. He had also been accused of stealing tools from David Todd, father of his brother's wife. In October 1872 he was charged with deserting his child. Given he married Agnes in 1886 this child was illegitimate and this probably



represents a charge laid by the mother in support of the child. He was 23 years old. In June 1873 he again ran amuck of the law when charged with feloniously and burglariously entering the House of Hamlet Pollett. He was also charged with impersonating a Police Constable! He was fined. The Police Gazette of 17th Dec 1873 shows Phillip was also charged with assault on the said Hamlet Pollett and he was convicted and sentenced to 6 months hard labour at Bathurst gaol. He was 24 years of age.

Elizabeth Raines, on the 26th ultimo, has been arrested by Senior Constable Redshaw, Liverpool Police.

A man named Phillip Foran, charged with having a stolen saddle in his possession, has been arrested by Constable Hanley, Rockley Police. Sentenced to two months' imprisonment in Bathurst Gaol.

A warrant has been issued by the Bathurst Bench, for the arrest of Philip Foran, charged with deserting his child. He is 23 years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, swarthy complexion, dark brown hair, the index finger of both hands have only two joints, most of the other fingers are crooked; dressed in dark-coloured clothes; a native of King's Creek; a labourer. Supposed to have gone to Campbell's River or King's Creek.

A warrant has been issued by the Newcastle Bench, for the arrest of Barnet Lambourne, charged with deserting his wife Leah, leaving her without the means of support. He is 46 years of age, 5 feet 5 inches high, stout build, dark hair mixed with gray; an Englishman; a labourer. Last heard of at Gulgong about a month ago.

Agnes and Phillip were married at St Peters Church Rockley on 18th June 1886. At the time Phillip is listed as a bachelor farmer of Kings Creek. Agnes was from Stony Creek. Mary Ann's younger sister Emma Amelia Smith was a witness.


Agnes and Phillip had 8 children:

- 1. John Walter Foran born 14th Dec 1886 so Agnes was pregnant when she married Phillip. He married **Ada Ainsworth** at Glebe Sydney in 1912. He served in WW1 in the AIF. He joined on 12th October 1917. His wife is listed as Ada and they live at 1 Cardigan St Glebe. He is five foot five and half inches, 9 stone 7 lbs of fair complexion with blue eyes and brown hair. He is Roman Catholic. He was based at Victoria Barracks and assigned on 16th October 1917 to Engineer Depot Moore Park. He was part of Engineer Reinforcements 2nd MD. He left Australia on the HMT Canberra on 16/11/1917. He disembarked at Suez on 21st December 1917 then Port Said on 12.1.1918. He then went to Southhampton UK on 30.1.1918 and returned to Australia 23rd Sept 1918 for discharge. His war record indicates he committed an offence in Suez with conduct prejudicial to the good order and military discipline -his offence? He appeared late on parade! Ada and John Walter had two children:
 - Jean Margaret Foran born 1915 according to family trees [annestev]
 - o John T Foran died 1928 in Redfern. NSW BDM Registration # 17877

Ada Foran died on 28th April 1918. This would have been before John Walter returned from the war. She is buried at Rookwood cemetery. He remarried in Newtown NSW on 1919 to a Nellie Hicks BDM # 8003. She was also known as Ellen Theresa Brown so we know the date of marriage is 31st May.

By 1928 he too was charged with deserting his child. Family tree annesteve indicate this charge was brought by Jean Margaret Foran who would have been 13 years of age.

John Walter Foran was living in Goulburn from 1930 according to the Electoral Rolls. In 1930 he is quarryman living at 24 Reynolds St but no sign of Nellie. From her death certificate we know she died in 1959 so where was she? In 1934 he is a quarryman and his address is c/o J Phillips Emma St Goulburn. Family trees indicate he was also known as John William Foran and he died at Young on 9th January 1951 although we do not have primary evidence for this. A search of NSW death records did not sbhow any death certificate for John Walter Foran in 1951.







On family tree Kate Flynn states he was formerly known as Charles McDonald Clark although cannot find further detail on this. There are divorce papers between a Charles McDonald Clark and Nellie Clark in 1920 and these do not indicate an alias of John William Harris. Charles Clark deserted his wife and 2 children in Victoria and went to war! John Harris's death certificate lists his father as Frederick Harris of Donald Victoria. It does not list a child named Susan so we don't know who Katleen's obit refers to . No mention of an alias of other marriage and children.





Lucy Ann Cash was born at Davey's Creek on 17th January 1866. She went on to marry **John Donley also spelt Donnelly** on 18th June 1886 at St Patricks Roman Catholic Church Rockley. John was the son of **Edward Donley** and **Honorah Moore**.

The Donleys: Edward Donley and Honorah Moore

An Oberon cousin descended from Lucy Ann has said:

"Edward Donley came on the Eliza in 1832. Donley is the correct way of spelling the Surname even though it appears spelt Donnelly in the Indexes. Edward was transported as Donley, John is buried Donley, Emily married as Donley and all her siblings D/Cs have it as Donley. Edward was transported for stealing a cow. He was from County Cork Irland and is buried in an unmarked grave with his wife and two of their four children at the old RC Cemetery O'Connell. Edward owned 40 acres in the Parish of Baring. Edward married Honorah Moore who migrated with her father James in 1856 being sponsored by their sister/daughter Johanna's husband John English. You will find them in the Rockley Manner and this family was in the Rockley and The Lagoon area. "

"Edward was transported on "Eliza" 6 arriving 6th September 1832 from Cork Ireland. He was tried 25th March 1832 at Cork for cow stealing and received 7 years. He was aged 31, a Roman Catholic, married from Cork and occupation listed as ploughs, reaps and sows. Edward did not read or write, was 5'5 3/4" in height of sallow complexion and freckled. He had sandy brown hair, hazel eyes a small mole on his right jaw: another on the right side of his chin and a front tooth on the right side upper jaw was broken..... From the Convict Employers Index 1832-1833 Edward is listed as a convict that ploughs assigned to John West Bathurst 5 Dec 1832"

Ref: Certificate of Freedom 40/1423

Edward died from Influenza. Date of death and date of burial do not coincide with death notice in the paper which is dated 4th Nov 1891. Edward is also shown as 101 and written up as a centenarian however it appears he was probably only approximately 91 as he continually changed his age as per Marriage and Childrens Birth Certificates. This was probably done to cover up the fact he was a convict. Date of birth shown on his Certificate of Freedom is 1801. Also in his son John's Obituary 1922, he is said to have been brought from Ireland to manage "Charlton" for Arkell. However, he is shown on all Birth and Death Certificates as a shepherd or boundary rider. He is also shown as a widow (1836 with one child deceased) on his marriage to Honora in 1856.

In addition we know from family historians that Edward was the son of **James Donley and Catherine Higgins** of Cork Ireland. Edward died on 30th November 1891 and was buried on 1st December 1891. He had been a boundary rider, farmer and shepherd during his life. **Honorah Moore** was born around 1831 in Ireland the daughter of **James Moore and Mary Johnson.**


Edward and Honorah had 4 children

- Mary Ann Donley born 12th July 1857 Mount Stromboli near Charlton. She died on 21st May 1877 at Brisbane Valley Creek and was buried on 23rd May 1877 at St Joseph's Roman Catholic Cemetery O'Connell. Mary Ann was 19 years of age.
- James Donley born 15th Dec 1858 at Brisbane Valley Creek and baptised on 22nd Feb 1859. He died on 2nd Sept 1860 at Brisbane Valley Creek. He was no quite 2 years old.
- Edward Donley born 24th February 1864 Brisbane Valley Creek and baptised on 9th March of that year.
 He died at Native Dog Creek Essington on 11th December 1878 aged 14 yrs and is buried at St Josephs cemetery OConnell

• *John Donley* was born 16th March 1861 at Brisbane Valley Creek and was the only child to marry and produce Donley heirs. John married Lucy Ann Cash on 16th June 1886 at St Patricks Church Rockley. She was noted as living with her parents and he a farmer.



Ref: Transcribed from church records by Irene Birch in 1980's lists marriage of Hanorah Mary Donley parents John Donley and Lucy Ann Cash to Arthur Ernest Schofield 21/2/1906. They had 2 children
 - Harold Ernest Schofield born 1906
 - Myrtle Rubina Scholfield born 1908
- 2. Thomas Edward Donley born 1889 at Brisbane Valley Creek . He married **Caroline Agnes Johnson** on 18th August 1909 at St Ignatius Church Oberon. Thomas and Caroline had 3 boys:
 - Augustus Ambrose Donley born 1911 and according to family historians he was considered simple. After his mother died her family raised Augustus.
 - Thomas Edward Donley born 1914 in Oberon and died in 1936 at Hornsby. Family historians note he died of broncho pneumonia at Peat and Milson Islands Hornsby NSW.



- 3. John Richard Donley born 14th March 1891 at Brisbane Valley Creek and baptised that year on 24th March at St Ignatius Church Oberon. [ref: cousin Lynn of Oberon from primary records]. The 1934 electoral roll has him living in Norway as a grazier with a wife **Grace Wilhelmina** [Warby] and possibly a son **Augustine**. We know he married **Grace Warby** on 13th Feb 1913 at St Ignatius Church Oberon. Nothing is known of **Augustine**. Grace's death index lists a daughter **Hazel J Donley**. We know Grace was the daughter of **William Edward Henry Warby** [1858-1932] and **Margaret Jane Hewitt** [1864-1943] born at Essington on 19th Sept 1893. Warby's owned land in the region and were considered by my father to have stolen Smith land at Native Dog Creek. I probably think unfairly bought is more like it. Family historians have John and Grace having 7 children:



Mr. John R. Donley, of Hydes Creek, who had not been in the best of health for some months, went out early one morning during the bush fires to find out how close the fires were getting to his property. As he did not ceturn, his wife became anxious and went out to see what had She found her hushappened. band dead near the house. Medical and police assistance were called, and after examining the reports of these officers the acting district coroner dispensed with an inquiry. Mr. Donley had come from the Bathurst district about four years ago and chased the property from the late Mr. A. P. Barlow. He leaves a widow and five children.

4. James Norman Donley born 22nd January 1893 Brisbane Valley Creek and was baptised on 15th March 1893 at St Ignatius Church Oberon. He married **Alice M. Lester aka Fox** [1890-1980] on 15th January 1930 at the Congregational Church Newtown. Family histories have Alice's surname as Lester but the marriage record lists it as Fox. BDM # 3950]. The electoral roll tells us they were living in Liverpool in 1934. **James** died on either the 27th or 31st October 1974 as the Find a Grave reference states 31st and family historians have cited 27th. James was a labourer.


- 5. Patrick Harold Donley born 28th March 1895 Brisbane Valley Creek baptised that year on 7th June at St Ignatius Oberon. He married **Veronica Mary Quinn** on 4th Dec 1927 at St Canice's Church Roslyn St Sydney according to family historians. Patrick died on 27th July 1965 and is buried at Woronora cemetery Sydney. He had been a railway employee and trimmers assistant.
- 6. Henry Joseph Donley -born 5th April 1898 at Brisbane Valley Creek and baptised at Essington on 22nd May 1898. Henry died on 10th October 1899 at Brisbane Valley Creek and is buried at St Jospeh's Church Oconnell with family members.
- 7. Emily Agnes Donley born 23rd March 1900 at Brisbane Valley Creek and baptised at St Igantious on 27th March that year . She married **William Lyle Dowling** at St Brigids Dubbo on 28th July 1921.

Charles Richard Cash died at Sydney Hospital aged 48 with an inquest being carried out on 21st January 1918. Charles was working at South Bulli Colliery as a miner and was struck on the head accidentally by a piece of coal.

James Francis was born in 1872 at Bathurst. He married **Matilda Monoghan** in 1923 at Bathurst [BDM # 2237]. Matilda died in on 29th August 1942 in Sydney and is buried in Rookwood Cemetery. Her gravesite inscription indicates she was "our mother" but we have no information on any children.

In 1930 the electoral roll has James living at Violet St Bathurst but no Matilda is listed.

James dies on the 17th July 1955 at Ryde Sydney according to family trees.


Child 6: Jane Cash

Child 7: William Henry Cash

William Henry was born in 1874 in Bathurst district. He married **Emma Armstrong** in 1911 at Bathurst.

She was the daughter of **John Armstrong** and his wife Frances Agincourt West. Emma had been born in 1877. John had been born near Taralga on 15th July 1829 so was a free settler. A family tree indicates Emma was the second eldest of 12 children. The Armstrong's were Irish through the paternal line of Charles Armstrong from Glenroy Clogher Parish County Tyrone. Charles had been convicted at the age of 13 yrs in 1819 of cow stealing and sent to Australia in 1820 on the ship Almorah for 7 years. Just 9 years later he is having children! Charles was discharged from the Establishment Emu Plains in July 1822.

Naomi herself was a convict having been sentenced to death then life for burglary at the Essex Assizes on 10th July 1826. She was transported on the "Harmony" and arrived in 1827. She was pardoned in 1845.

Emma dies aged 40 yrs in 1917 in Bathurst. There is no evidence of children of the marriage currently.

William then marries **Beatrice M Piper** in 1919 at Bathurst.

William dies on 18th October 1829 and is buried at Bathurst Cemetery. He was 35 years old. The inscription reads

"In loving memory of William Cash, died Oct. 18th 1929 aged 35 years. At rest. (marble slab on H/S) - In memory of Beatrice May Cash, born 7-4-1883 died 7-10-1977. (Aluminium plaque below above on H/S)"


Newspaper report. Inquest into Woman's Death It has been decided to hold an inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death of Mrs. Daisy Martin, of Wilkins Street, Bathurst. Mrs Martin, who was 27 years of age, died in Bathurst on Friday last, and was buried the following day. The inquest is to be held by the Bathurst Coroner (Mr. A.B. Burgess) at 10 o'clock on Thursday Morning.

Inquiry On Young Mother's Death The Bathurst Coroner (Mr. A.B. Burgess) yesterday held an inquiry into the circumstances surrounding the death on May 28 of Mrs. Daisy Martin (27) of Wilkins Street, the mother of five children. He found that she died from septicemia following an abortion but how or by what means such abortion was caused the evidence did not enable him to say.

Detective Constable J.W. Bunnell said when he saw Mrs Martin in Bathurst Hospital he told her he had come to see what made her so sick.

She said she was playing with her young daughter and the two eldest boys on the front steps on her home on May 25, and they were all humping from the top step to the ground. She said there were four or five steps. she said she felt all right after playing with the children but after she prepared tea, she started to haemorrhage and she went to bed. she did not do anything to prevent herself from having the baby.

The deceased's dying depositions were taken by the chamber magistrate on May 27, said witness. Dr R.D. Mulvey, Government medical officer, said death was due to a septicemic condition, consquent on an abortion in the second month of pregnancy. It was unlikely that the happening could have been brought about by a fall.



HUSBAND'S EVIDENCE

Thomas Francis Martin, wardsman at the District Hospital and husband of the deceased, said his wife appeared to be in her usual health when he left home for work on May 25. when he returned about 2 pm on May 26, his wife was in bed, and complained of a severe headache and pains in the back. He asked if he would get a doctor, and she replied. "No, I think I will be all right after a rest." The pains became worse, and at 5 pm he called a doctor. He told deceased to remain in bed and keep warm, and to let him know if she did not get any better. She did not improve, and the doctor, when called again, ordered her to hospital. Her condition became worse and she died about 3 am on May 28.




How sad that Daisy had to die because in those times abortion was illegal. She was just 28 years old and left 6 little children for her husband to raise.
